

Wearing and caring for your Essix Retainer

Congratulations - you have come to the end of your fixed appliance therapy! In order to give your teeth the best chance of stability you will need to wear a retainer. The orthodontist has chosen an Essix retainer for you. It is important that you follow the instructions given to you and wear your retainer well.

Why do I need this appliance?

The essix retainer will hold your teeth in the new corrected position after your orthodontic therapy.

What are the alternatives?

We can fit you with a different kind of retainer called a Hawley which will do the same job but which will need to be worn all the time.

What are the potential risks and side effects?

If you do not wear your retainer there is a risk that your teeth will relapse back and all your hard work of wearing a fixed brace will be undone.

What are the expected benefits of treatment?

By wearing your retainer well the new position of the teeth will be stable and there is a smaller chance of relapse.

Do I need follow up appointments with the orthodontist?

The orthodontist will want to see you every three/six months for up to a maximum of one year. After 12 months you will be discharged and advised to maintain your retainer long term with an orthodontist in practice. This will be charged with a fee.

How often will I need to wear my retainer?

- You must wear your retainer as instructed by your orthodontist eg, full time for the first two months.
- Then you can progress to evenings and nights for a further two months and as long as the retainer is easy to get in and out after a further two months you can go to night time wear only.
- If you find that the retainer is tight to fit then wear it for longer periods of time as this indicates that the teeth are moving!

How do I care for my retainer?

- The Essix retainer is made from thin plastic which has been made on a model of your teeth.
- Remove when eating and store safely in your brace box; as you may chew through it. Clean your teeth and retainer once finished and re-insert your retainer.
- If you have a drink whilst wearing it, take the retainer out afterwards and rinse it as drink will pool into the retainer which will hold the liquid against your teeth. This is especially important with sugary drinks as this can lead to decay.

How do I clean my retainer?

You can clean your retainer by washing it in tepid soapy water (fragrance free liquid soap will be fine) and brushing it gently with a tooth brush. Rinsing any residue once finished.

What happens if I lose or break my retainer?

You will be given a brace box to put your retainer in when you are not wearing it. Unfortunately if you lose the retainer or you break it we will need to make you a new one. You will be charged for a replacement as we can only provide one set of retainers free.

Consent

Although you consent for this treatment, you may at any time after that withdraw such consent. Please discuss this with your medical team.
