Open Access to the Children's Units – A Parent's Guide

Children with short term illnesses

Your child has been admitted to the Children's Ward (Kipling) or the Short Stay Paediatric Assessment Unit (SSPAU). The doctors are happy for you to take your child home but we know that sometimes it takes a few days for children to get better and we feel that it would be helpful for you to have open access.

You will have **open access** for 24 hours after your child has been discharged, or if your child is discharged at the weekend, open access may extend until Monday morning. This means that if your child's condition gets worse, does not start to improve, or you have further concerns relating to this current illness, you can contact the children's unit on the numbers provided below. The doctor or nurse will listen to your concerns and decide on a plan, which may be either

- To provide reassurance and/or further advice about what you can do at home
- Advise you to bring your child back to hospital.

If you still think that your child is not improving and it is after 24 hours following discharge, you will need to take him/her to your GP.

If your child becomes unwell with a **different** illness or symptoms after being discharged from hospital, you will need to take him/her to the GP, not contact or return to, the hospital.

Children with long term conditions

If your child has a long term condition, you may have been told that they can have long term open access to the ward. Open access applies if:

- Your child becomes unwell due to deterioration in their long term condition
- With an illness related to the long term condition
- With an illness that makes their long term condition worse

It does not apply if they have an illness that is unrelated to their long term condition which is stable. In this case please take your child to the GP.

If your child is unwell, please take them to the GP in the first instance or contact the Children's Community Nurse if you usually see one.

Children receiving treatment for cancer who have febrile neutropenia must be brought directly to the children's unit. Please phone us first.

If your child is very unwell and you feel that they need urgent care they must be taken to the Emergency Department (ED/A&E) first, not brought directly to the children's unit.

Please do not bring your child directly to the children's unit without letting us know you are coming. It is important that we know they are coming so that we can prepare for their arrival or we may be able to give you advice which will avoid you having to bring your child in to hospital. If the unit is busy there may be a delay in your child's treatment if we are not expecting them.
