Wound care following excision of Skin Lesion

Excision refers to removal of a skin lesion (for example a tumour, mole or cyst) by completely cutting it out.

How will I feel afterwards?

You have had a local anaesthetic for the excision of a skin lesion. The area will be numb for a short time and then a gentle throbbing sensation may be felt as the local anaesthetic wears off. If you experience any pain a mild painkiller such as paracetamol can be taken.

What should I do when I go home?

Dependant upon the local anaesthetic used and the procedure that you are having done, you may be advised not to drive or operate machinery for the rest of that day.

Avoid heavy lifting or stretching of wound area for fourteen days to prevent wound damage.

The wound should be kept clean and dry for two days.

If the wound starts to bleed apply pressure for 20 minutes. If your wound is still bleeding then contact one of the telephone numbers at the end of this information sheet or your G.P.

After two days you can remove the dressing and shower, but do not soak in a bath. Replace a new dressing after showering.

If your wound has a white bandage over it [tubigrip] then this should be worn during the day only and removed at night, until your stitches are removed.

If your wound appears inflamed, you observe a discharge or you experience increased pain contact one of the telephone numbers at the end of this information sheet or your G.P.

Stitch removal

Make an appointment to see the Practice Nurse at your GP's surgery in ____ days for the removal of stiches.

How will I hear about the results?

You will be advised of your histology results in approximately six to eight weeks' time. If you have not been advised of your results by eight weeks then contact your Doctor.

Consent

Although you consent for this treatment, you may at any time after that withdraw such consent. Please discuss this with your medical team.
