

Post Procedure Advice following an Endoscopic Mucosal Resection/Large Polyp Removal

Following your examination today you are advised to go home and rest.

If your procedure was carried out with a conscious sedative injection or a general anaesthetic, it is important for the next 24 hours **you do not:**

Drive a car/motorbike or ride a bicycle
Operate any domestic appliances or machinery
Look after young children alone

Sign any legal documents
Drink alcohol
Take sleeping tablets

One of the effects of sedation is that you may not remember having the procedure, this is normal.

The same or another responsible adult that collects you from the Endoscopy Unit should stay with you for the next 12 hours.

How will I feel after the procedure?

Polyp removal can cause blood to be present when you have your bowels open. Delayed bleeding may occur anytime from 12 hours to 14 days. A small amount of blood (a teaspoon or less) is relatively common. If significant bleeding occurs, it is vital that you seek **urgent** medical attention.

In order to control bleeding during your Colonoscopy, several techniques or prophylactic manoeuvres may be undertaken. These techniques include applying an 'endoclip' (a metal clip which is silver in colour) to the site of the bleed or applying an 'endoloop' (a detachable oval shaped nylon snare). Within a week you may notice these in the toilet pan when you open your bowels. Do not be alarmed when this happens as it is quite normal.

You may feel a little bloated for the rest of the day due to the air put in your bowel during the procedure, to help relieve this try sitting up, walking around, taking warm drinks and peppermints. Make sure you drink plenty of water.

If your procedure was carried out with sedation you may feel sleepy for the remainder of the day.

When should I seek help/advice?

Serious side effects are rare however if any of the following occur within 48 hours-14 days after your Endoscopic mucosal resection/large polyp removal, consult a doctor immediately:

Vomiting blood
Severe abdominal pain
Severe Bloating
Passing blood from your back passage
Chest pains

Fainting
Shortness of breath
Fever or chills
Bowel motions turn black
Bright red blood in stool
