# **Post Procedure Advice following Bronchoscopy**

Following your examination today you are advised to go home and rest.

If your procedure was carried out with a conscious sedative injection or a general anaesthetic, it is important for the next 24 hours **you do not:** 

Drive a car/motorbike or ride a bicycle Operate any domestic appliances or machinery Look after young children alone Sign any legal documents Drink alcohol Take sleeping tablets

One of the effects of sedation is that you may not remember having the procedure, this is normal.

A responsible adult should stay with you for 12 hours following your procedure if you have been given sedation.

### How will I feel after the procedure?

Your nose and throat may feel a little sore for a short period of time after your bronchoscopy. You are likely to cough more than usual until the effects of the bronchoscopy have worn off. If your procedure was carried out with sedation you may feel sleepy for the remainder of the day.

You can eat and drink as normal and take your usual medications.

### When should I seek help/advice?

Serious side effects are rare however if any of the following occur within 48 hours after your bronchoscopy, consult a doctor immediately by attending your nearest Emergency Department:

- Excessive shortness of breath (if not relieved by your usual inhalers/medications)
- Coughing up large volumes of blood
- Chest pains or fast heart rate
- Fever
- Cyanosis (bluish discoloration of skin)
