Fiberoptic Endoscopic Evaluation of Swallow (FEES) Clinic

You have been given an appointment to attend the FEES Clinic run by the Speech and Language Therapy Department. This information sheet provides you with information about the clinic.

Why have I been referred for FEES?

You have been referred for FEES because you have some difficulties with swallowing. FEES enables us to examine your swallowing and your throat in detail.

Speech and Language Therapists are trained to assess and treat swallowing problems and some throat symptoms. This examination will help us plan your therapy and give you useful feedback as to what is happening.

What is FEES and what will happen during my appointment?

FEES uses a small, flexible fibreoptic camera or "endoscope". This will be placed into one nostril and moved carefully through your nose. The camera will rest just beyond the back of the nose with a clear view of your throat.

The procedure will be carried out by two Speech and Language Therapists. It will take place in the Ear, Nose and Throat Department or on the ward. You will be seated, unless already in a hospital bed. The procedure will last 10-20 minutes though your appointment may be up to an hour to allow time for discussion.

During the procedure you will be asked to carry out some tasks so we can assess how the structures in your throat move. You will be given some food and drink to swallow. This is dyed with a small amount of food dye to help it show up easily in your throat. The pictures from the camera will be recorded to be reviewed and analysed at a later time.

Do I need to bring anything with me to the FEES appointment?

Please bring with you any special cups or feeding utensils that you may use to help you with your eating and drinking. If there are specific foods that you find difficult to swallow and you would like to try, you can bring these with you. Remember to wear your dentures if you normally have these in when you eat and drink.

When will I know the results?

You will be given some basic feedback and advice immediately after the procedure. However, detailed results will only be available when a report has been written. The report will be sent to you and your doctor, and a copy will be filed in your medical notes.

Is the procedure painful? Is the procedure safe?

The passing of the endoscope through the nose may cause mild to moderate discomfort for some people. Once it is in place above the throat, any discomfort stops.

The procedure is extremely safe with a low risk of complications or side effects. There is a small chance of nose bleeds, feeling faint or feeling tightness in your throat. The amount of food and

drink you will be given is carefully controlled, however due to your swallowing difficulties there is a risk that some of the food/drink may go the 'wrong way' into your lungs.

Can I eat before this procedure?

Yes you can eat and drink before this procedure unless you have been advised otherwise.

What happens afterwards?

You can go home immediately after the appointment. If you are in hospital you will stay on the ward. If you require follow up an appointment will then be made with Speech and Language Therapy to provide on-going support with your symptoms.
