Suppression Therapy prior to elective Caesarean Section

Information for women delivering by planned caesarean at the Conquest Hospital

Staphylococcus aureus is a common bacterium (germ) which can be found on the skin or in the nose of about a third of the population. Many normal healthy people have Staphylococcus aureus on their skin without causing them any harm. MRSA (Meticillin resistant Staphylococcus aureus) is a type of Staphylococcus aureus, which is resistant to the more commonly used antibiotics against Staphylococcus aureus associated infections. Most of the time skin is colonised with MSSA (Meticillin sensitive Staphylococcus aureus).

It is recommended that an MRSA/ MSSA suppression therapy is used prior to your caesarean section. The aim of the MRSA/ MSSA suppression therapy is to decrease the risk of wound infection by reducing the amount of MRSA/MSSA found on the skin.

You will be given a pack containing:

- Chlorhexidine antiseptic gluconate 4% solution
- Octenisan nasal gel or Naseptin nasal cream

(Do not use Naseptin if you are allergic (hypersensitive) to chlorhexidine dihydrochloride, neomycin sulfate, peanuts or soya or any of the other ingredients of Naseptin. If the above applies to you, or if you are not sure, speak to your doctor or pharmacist about an alternative agent).

These should be used for up to five days prior to surgery

Chlorhexidine gluconate 4% solution

Use once a day as a soap and shampoo substitute in the bath or shower for up to five days. Do not dilute in water but apply directly to the skin.

- Step 1 Ensure hair and body are totally wet
- Step 2 Pour Chlorhexidine onto a single use washcloth or apply directly to skin, using 25 ml for the whole body
- Step 3 Wash the whole body and hair beginning with the face and working downwards, paying particular attention to the armpits, belly button, groin and perineum (area of skin around bottom). Avoid contact with eyes and ears.
- Step 4 Rinse off thoroughly
- Step 5 Dry with a clean and dry towel
- Step 6 Continue to wash daily with Chlorhexidine.

Octenisan nasal gel - Apply to the inside of both nostrils twice a day for up to five days in total. Or: Naspetin nasal cream - Apply to the inside of both nostrils four times a day for up to 5 days in total.

How should I apply nasal ointment cream?

- 1. Wash your hands prior to applying nasal ointment cream
- 2. Unscrew the cap and squeeze a small amount of ointment / cream (about the size of a match head) on to your little finger.
- 3. Apply ointment to the inside of one nostril.
- 4. Repeat for the other nostril.
- 5. Close your nostrils by pressing the sides of the nose together for a moment. This will spread the ointment inside each nostril.
- 6. Wash your hands and replace the cap on the tube
