CT Colon Aftercare Advice

Advice Post CT Colon scan

Please use the toilet and take your time before you leave the hospital. The Carbon Dioxide we have used to inflate your bowel is absorbed quickly by your body and any mild pain and bloating should not take long to pass.

You can return to your normal eating and drinking pattern. We recommend that you drink plenty of fluids for the following 2-3 days.

You should not experience any after affects from this procedure. If you experience any severe pains or prolonged discomfort in your abdomen after you have left the hospital, you should attend your local Accident and Emergency (A&E) Department or contact your GP explaining you have recently undergone a CT Colonography.

Advice Post Hycosine Butylbromide (Buscopan) Injection

If you have been given an injection of Hyoscine Butylbromide (Buscopan), which is used to relax the muscles in the bowel wall, you may have blurred vision. This side effect is short lived, usually about 30 minutes.

If you do experience this blurring, please make sure your vision has returned to normal before driving. It is very rare but if you develop a red painful eye, you should attend your local Accident and Emergency (A&E) Department or contact your GP explaining you have recently had Buscopan for a CT Colonography.

Results

Your images will be reviewed by a Radiologist and a full report will be sent to the referring doctor within 1 - 2 weeks. An appointment will then be arranged to discuss your results with your doctor.
